Palm and Passion Sunday, March 20 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. services

Traditional Palm Sunday Processional followed by the reading of the Passion narrative with Tableaus Celebrate Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem and relive the events of His suffering and death. After the festive beginning of the service, the pastors will read the Passion story while church members of all ages form living pictures of the various events, including the last supper, Jesus in the garden of Gethsemane, the betrayal and the crucifixion. A *tableau vivant* is French for *"living picture."* The service will end with Chris Stone singing *"Jesus Walked that Lonesome Valley"* and the congregation leaving in silence.

<u>Maundy Thursday, March 24</u> Meal of the Upper Room, 12:15 p.m.

Join us for this solemn and spiritual observance of the last supper that Jesus shared with his disciples in the upper room, on what is now known as Maundy Thursday. Gather in the Meetinghouse for words of preparation, and then proceed in silence to Schultz Hall for readings, the meal and the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Participants eat in silence so that they may prayerfully taste the foods and listen to the reading of the Holy Scripture. Ginger Kousen, soprano, will sing. Please call the church office if you are interested in attending. *This event is sponsored by the Board of Deacons and the Board of Lay Life and Ministry*.

Service of Tenebrae & Holy Communion, 7:30 p.m.

A solemn service of lessons and hymns accompanied by the gradual extinguishing of lights, symbolic of the flight of the disciples and the passion of our Lord. Special music will be sung by the Chancel Choir.

⁹A Prayer for Our Mission in the World

The following pastoral prayer was offered in worship on Sunday, January 17 by Katharyn Laudone, after her participation in the mission trip to Back Bay Mission, Biloxi, Mississippi earlier in the month.

Dear Heavenly Father;

We thank you for this day, for this time to gather here and reflect on one mission of the church. We learn from your word of your great love for us, and we learn of Jesus 'mission to love us, to heal the sick, to feed the hungry and to care for the needy.

We thank you for all that Christ taught us and for the good works the church has accomplished over the years. Though we recognize this church building as a holy sanctuary, a meetinghouse and a shelter from the cold, help us to remember that the church is also Christ's body. We the people, his body, need to continue his mission for the church. We learn this lesson from Paul's conversion on the road to Damascus. Jesus' voice from heaven informed Saul that the Christian people he was persecuting were in fact Jesus' own body.

We the people of the church, here today, are his mind, his eyes, his ears, his mouth, his hands, his feet, his heart and his spirit. May we keep this visual image in focus and remember who we are.

Now we are the body of Christ and each one of us has a part of it. If one part suffers, every other part suffers with it. If one child is hungry, we are all hungry. If one part is honored, every part rejoices! When we make others smile, we make you smile.

We witnessed this past week in Biloxi with The Back Bay Mission and we ask that you please continue to bless their good work. We are so grateful for that opportunity to serve there, for our safe travels, for the safety of the working crews, for the beautiful weather to complete the outdoor jobs, and for the fellowship and fun times we shared. We helped each other to rebuild a home, to clean and paint others, to feed the hungry, to provide hot showers and clean clothes and to help restore some dignity for the needy and homeless.

We are together, one with you Lord, yet you call each of us by name. You treasure each of us individually and bless us with unique gifts. While we were there, each contributed and reflected your image in different ways, from delivering pastries to performing lifesaving CPR skills. We acknowledge the beauty of this diversity within our church.

We have also learned from Mother Teresa who once said, "I know I am touching the living body of Christ in the broken bodies of the hungry and suffering." Help us to recognize and appreciate that all people, those helping and those being helped, are made in your image and likeness.

Now we are home again in Glastonbury and we see that your good work continues here. There are opportunities in the church, in our communities, at our work places, in our homes and in our neighborhoods. And the people are willing. We only need look to those who are sitting to the right and left of us to see your face. It is a kind of beauty that is possible with your help, oh Lord, and we are so grateful for it!

In closing, we ask for your wisdom and guidance as we continue to serve so that the mission of your church, the body of Christ, may be built up.




Prayer and Share

Calling Knitters and Crocheters!





The First Church family of faith has many talented people, and some of



Food Collection


First Church has had a long tradition of collecting food items for our neighbors in need. Our donations go to Horace Bushnell

Refugee Resettlement Update

Over many decades, First Church has a rich tradition of "welcoming the stranger" as exhorted by our Biblical tradition. The Board of Christian Service held an information meeting on November 23, when Chris George, Executive Director of IRIS, spoke to the gathered group. At the Board of Christian Service's December meeting, this initiative was enthusiastically endorsed. We now have an active Refugee Resettlement Committee, along with an even greater number of other church family members willing to provide support in areas including housing, transportation, employment, education, health care, public benefits and others. The committee has met several times, and submitted a self-assessment form as required. Members are expecting to attend a training session at IRIS later this month in preparation for being assigned a refugee family to settle here in Glastonbury. 

Our congregation has a history of giving generously to our special offerings. Thanks to you, we collected \$11,746 for our Easter offering. \$1,500 of that went to Heads Up! Hartford, and the balance went to One Great Hour of Sharing. The Thanksgiving 2015 offering yielded a collection of \$8,712.
