"Building a Legacy" Capital Campaign The Micah House and Chapel at the Thomas Hale Homestead



The Capital Campaign and Building Committees are excited to report wonderful progress and support towards making The Micah House project a reality. Since the kick-off of the "Building a Legacy" capital campaign, we have received \$602,500 in commitments towards our \$700,000 campaign goal!!

On April 18, 2016, the Glastonbury Historic District Commission conducted a public hearing on First Church's application to approve The Micah House project. The Building Committee cleanup crew has worked hard to clear plaster from the Hale House which will significantly lower contracting costs. The Historic District Commission's April 18 public hearing is anticipated to be the first of several steps leading toward ultimate town approval for the project.



Over the past month, the Capital Campaign Committee has been calling and visiting members of the congregation to solicit financial support.

If you have already returned your pledge card—thank you!! While progress has been made towards reaching the capital campaign goal, additional funds must still be raised in support of this project. 



"Sherman remains one of the most celebrated and controversial military icons in American history. Adored by his Union troops during the Civil War as Uncle Billy, he was despised by Southerners as the monster who mercilessly waged war upon the civilian population in Georgia and the Carolinas. Praised by some for his effective campaigns against the Plains Indians, he was condemned by others as a proponent of genocide. By nature and inclination, he despised the pretensions and affectations of the wealthy, but he mixed with them freely and aspired to match their financial success. He claimed to hate politicians and journalists, yet he talked incessantly in their presence



their financial success. He claimed to hate politicians and journalists, yet he talked incessantly in their presence, and his off-the-cuff remarks often served to distort his true views. Despite the apparently wanton destruction of Sherman's March, he actually kept tight discipline over his troops. Women's Theological Reflection Group




Calling Knitters and Crocheters!





Kids' Night In/Parents' Night Out, April 30, 4:00 - 7:00 p.m.




