Micah House and Chapel Update August 2017

In the New Testament, there is a story of Jesus feeding 5,000 people with only five loaves of bread and two fish. In Matthew 14:13-21, Jesus told the Disciples: "Bring them here to me," he said. ¹⁹And he directed the people to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. Then he gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the people. ²⁰They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces that were left over. ²¹The number of those who ate was about five thousand men, besides women and children.

As Jesus fed his followers, the Micah House and Chapel will provide spiritual food to First Church's members and the surrounding community. This miracle continues to amaze visitors, friends and congregation members!! Take a moment and look outside when you are visiting church or attending Sunday worship services. The First Church live cam shows an up-to-the minute live action of the work towards revitalizing the historic Thomas Hale Homestead into the Micah House and Chapel.





George Fay, the project's contractor, and his team have begun the next phase of renewal and construction. The building was lifted, the chimney stabilized, the new foundation poured and settled and there are now walls on all four sides of the house. Praise the Lord!!

People are asking – how can I help? Volunteers are needed to help clean off 250-year-old bricks. Anyone can help, no previous experience needed! In the coming weeks we need to clean up hundreds of salvaged bricks for reuse on the Micah House concrete foundation. Volunteers can contact Jonathan Russell at cjic5@cox.net for this project.

Just as a reminder, for safety's sake, please don't talk to the contractors as they work on the Micah House and Chapel. Everyone is excited and curious about the construction but distracting a contractor from their work is a potential safety hazard! Please direct all questions to Jonathan Russell, Mick Gifford or Walt Briggs who continues to provide handson financial and construction oversight. Estimates of sweat-equity cost savings to date exceed \$40,000.

The Micah House and Chapel at the Thomas Hale Homestead is God's miracle and will be a legacy that serves First Church today and for future generations!!

Reflections from the Connecticut Conference Annual Meeting (by Lois Kulas): The 150th annual meeting of the Connecticut Conference, UCC, took place in Hartford the last weekend in June. For the first time, the annual Connecticut Conference meeting was held jointly with the Rhode Island and Massachusetts Conferences. While some concerns were expressed, each of the three state conferences voted strongly in favor of taking the next step toward possibly joining together as one. The vote was based on faith that the move may be beneficial. However, specifics have yet to be worked out, including structure, operation specifics, financial arrangements and name. The affirmative vote has granted Conference leaders permission to develop a formal, detailed, *Together as One* proposal for a new, three-state conference, which will be brought before next year's joint annual conference meeting.

Connecticut also voted in support of the two resolutions presented at the Connecticut portion of the conference. The first resolution recommended churches mark **Transgender Remembrance Sunday**, which would be the **Sunday prior to November 20**, recognized internationally as Transgender Day of Remembrance. In the resolution, it was noted: *transgender people are a minority who are victims of verbal and physical abuse which has resulted in cases of murder (1200 transgender people, more than 200 each year have been reported killed over the last five years) and suicide (41 percent of transgender people living in the United States have attempted suicide) out of proportion to their numbers due to ignorance, prejudice, and a lack of understanding or education among the majority. One person stood up to say we need to do even more in support of and as allies of transgender people.*

The second resolution recommended the Connecticut UCC Conference become an "Accessible to All" Conference. In the resolution, it was stated: *The United States Census Bureau records show that 19 percent of respondents report having a disability and an increasing senior population will experience difficulties with mobility, vision, and hearing* and *a study conducted by the National Organization on Disability and the Kessler Foundation found that people with disabilities are 35 percent more likely to never attend a worship service than their non-disabled peers.*

The passed resolutions are intended as suggestions to congregations, rather than specific directions. Each church is asked to consider the resolutions, and then take appropriate action according to the wishes of the congregation.

The Keynote address was given by the Rev. Dr. John Dorhauer, author, theologian, and ninth General Minister and President of the UCC. Rev. Dr. Maritza Angulo de Gonzalez, pastor of Manantial de Gracia "Spring of Grace," UCC in New Britain, was preacher for the opening worship. Joelle A. Murchison, Associate Vice President and Chief Diversity Officer at the University of Connecticut received the **2017 Living Water Award** for "guiding efforts to define, assess, and promote diversity, inclusion, and educational and employment access and opportunity." **Next year's Tri-Conference will be held June 15 – 16, 2018 in Springfield, MA.**

Opportunities to Volunteer with Foodshare!

FOODSHARE Foodshare's vision is for a community where all people can get the food they need. As the region's food bank they work toward that vision by getting food donations from the food industry and distributing them to 300 food pantries, community kitchens, homeless shelters and other partner programs.

There are **three ways to get involved** with Foodshare here at First Church.

- Volunteer when the Mobile Foodshare truck comes to our back parking lot every other Wednesday morning at 10:00 a.m. This is a "farmer's market" style food distribution of fresh produce and other foods, and it takes many volunteers to serve everyone who comes. If you are interested in participating (adults, youth and children are welcome!), contact Sally Riddell at 860-657-8715.
- Volunteer at Foodshare's Regional Market in Hartford on alternating Wednesday mornings to help sort and package the produce that gets given out on the Mobile Foodshare truck at various sites across the state. 
3rd Grade Bible Recognition

There will be *registration for Church School* before and after the service. Every child needs to be registered each year.


Sunday, September 17



Meet Our 2017 First Church Music Scholarship Recipients

Each year, the Board of Music offers one or more scholarships to young Glastonbury musicians in an effort to encourage their study of music and to promote and enhance the worship experiences of their generation. In 2017, we received eleven applications, heard auditions for nine, and awarded four scholarships to the following recipients. These scholarships are funded in part from the budget of the Board of Music and from a generous contribution by one of the members of First Church. Their awards will go directly toward the expense of future private lessons to encourage their continued development as serious musicians of their generation. Each of them will be sharing their extraordinary talents with us in a worship service at some time in the coming year. When you experience that,

we are sure you will agree that they each possess a gift and musical talent that is worthy of our encouragement.

Sofia DiNatale, who just completed 10th grade at Glastonbury High School, auditioned on piano, which she has been studying for seven years, and also studies cello. In addition to being in the Jazz Band and Chamber Ensemble at GHS, she is a member of the Glastonbury Youth Orchestra and Connecticut Youth Symphony. She has given concerts and participated in festivals and competitions in Connecticut, as well as performed at Carnegie Hall. Sofia intends to continue her music studies in college and hopes to attend a music conservatory.

Teryn Kuzma is a student at the University of Connecticut with a double major in Speech, Language, and Hearing Science and Music, with a concentration in Vocal Performance. She hopes to combine the two in a career. Teryn has been a regular performer in her church and school choirs and has received her Performance Certificate from the Hartt School of Music. Teryn also plays the 55-string Ukrainian bandura, and is a founding member of the newly formed Women's Bandura Ensemble of North America.

Alex Richter just completed his sophomore year at GHS and a is a member of our First Church family, where he has already performed on cello in string ensembles, including at the open house event last winter. Alex has been studying cello since age nine and is taking lessons with a private teacher as well as at school. Last summer, and again this year, Alex participated in the Elm City Chamber Festival. He has been a member of the New England Music Festival orchestra and a winner of the American Protege Contest, which resulted in an opportunity to perform at Carnegie Hall last year during the Christmas season.

Mai Vestergaard is a Glastonbury resident who attends the University of Connecticut. In addition to her music studies at UConn, Mai studies with a private teacher in New Haven. She auditioned on violin, and also studies viola. She has performed as a soloist with the West Hartford Symphony Orchestra, as well as participated in Eastern Honors and All-National Symphony Orchestras. This summer she is studying Chamber Music in Austria at AlpenKammerMusic. Mai has a double-major at UConn in Music and Pharmaceutical Sciences.









Adult Mission Trip December 31 – January 6



What is the history of these mission trips? Back Bay Mission is a social service agency of the United Church of Christ, serving the poorest citizens of the Biloxi, Mississippi, area since 1929. First Church sent a senior high work camp group there in February, 2005 – six months before Hurricane Katrina devastated the Gulf Coast. In January, 2006, alumni members of the 2005 trip, along with a number of adults, went to Biloxi to assist with recovery efforts, and the adult mission trip tradition was born. BBM has now expanded its effort to help house homeless vets.

Who can go? Anyone over 18 years of age. Because sleeping capacity at Back Bay Mission is fixed, we are limited to 40 work campers.

What kind of work will we do? Sometimes we work on new construction, other times on renovation. We could be installing insulation, hanging, taping and

mudding drywall, installing exterior siding, roofing or painting.

Do I have to be skilled in construction work? Not at all. There are a number of repeat campers with specialized skills who serve as crew leaders and patient teachers, and they match the jobs to be done with the inventory of skills our group has. People who'd rather not operate a nail gun or a table saw still have the opportunity to contribute by serving at a local soup kitchen, organizing the food bank, helping keep the work sites tidy or preparing meals for our group.


