Micah House Dream to be Fulfilled in 2017

After lying dormant for more than nine years and after months and months of preparation, the dream of revitalizing the historic Thomas Hale Homestead into the Micah House and Chapel is

on track to be realized in 2017! Alleluia!





The TPZ Commission approved the project on November 15 and even congratulated the congregation on such a visionary and worthwhile re-use of the historic property. Many thanks to the great folks at Milone and MacBroom for the wonderful plans.

An enthusiastic construction manager, George Fay, has been selected and is totally committed to the project! Jonathan Russell and Walt Briggs have volunteered to serve as project manager and assistant project manager, respectively, to provide hands-on

oversight. The \$950,000 authorized by the congregation has been reached thanks to the dedication of the Fundraising Committee, under the direction of Earl Thompson. THANK YOU to all who have pledged! Members of the Building Committee continue to save the congregation THOUSANDS of dollars by providing hands-on demolition of parts of the Hale House, with special care being given to preserve anything that is reusable.

During the upcoming weeks interior demolition will continue, interior design plans will be finalized, a full building permit will be applied for and a dumpster and storage trailer will arrive on the property. Weather permitting, the hope is to turn the building over to George Fay in March or early April to begin the renovation and

First Church is a place where we are constantly serving our neighbors in need. It is our call and our privilege to spread God's love in our church community, in Glastonbury, in Hartford, in other Connecticut towns and cities, throughout our nation and all around the world.

The Al Abas Family in Glastonbury

This month will mark six months that the Al Abas family, refugees from Syria, have lived in Glastonbury. The last month has been full of big changes on the employment front. Almost immediately after Zevad finished his seasonal work at Killam & Bassette Farm in South Glastonbury, he started a full-time position at Langan VW right in town. Zeyad will be doing odd jobs and car detailing. Although Zeyad is both hardworking and personable, finding a full-time position so quickly would not have happened were it not for the persistent efforts of several church members who worked diligently with Zeyad by helping him to develop a resume, fill out job applications, drive him to interviews, and the like.

In an additional stroke of both good luck and real persistence, if you happen to go to Max Amore for dinner in Glastonbury, you may run in to Walid or Mohammad, since they are both working in the kitchen after school several days per week. As their restaurant skills improve, they are hoping that you may see them in the dining room as well. Their work will help to supplement the family income since supporting a family of seven is no small feat.

Everyone in the family is continuing to work on their English skills. All five children report that they love going to school in Glastonbury because their teachers are so nice and they are making new friends. Meanwhile, Zeyad and Ezdehar continue with English Language Learner classes in the evenings. Church members continue to volunteer to drive the parents on nights when classes are in Wethersfield. And while mom and dad are at class, other volunteers help the children with their homework.

In November, the whole family attended the Interfaith Thanksgiving Service that was held at First Church this year. They celebrated their first Thanksgiving dinner with a church family.

Volunteer carpenters and electricians installed a new sliding glass door for the landlord in exchange for a rent reduction. The door will enable larger furniture and appliances to go in and out of the more than 100 year old house.

Thanks to the continuing efforts of our nurse volunteers, the family continues to have their health and dental needs monitored and care is arranged when needed. Other volunteers continue to help the family with grocery shopping including trips to Mobile Foodshare, the local food pantry, and Carols's Closet for paper goods. The family is fully outfitted with warm coats, hats and gloves (thanks to many generous donations from church members), and they even have snow shovels and ice melt at the ready. distribution service that provides fresh produce and other food items to between 90 and 150 lower income people. Foodshare sponsors this service, and it takes place every other Wednesday (January 4 and 18) in our back parking lot. Besides distributing food to needy people in our parking lot twice a month, our volunteers collect food from ShopRite in East Hartford, bringing 500 to 1,000 lbs of meat, produce, baked goods and groceries weekly to shelters and soup kitchens in Hartford. Thanks for the Donations to Carol's Closet!





Church School Unit 4: "Zacchaeus"

Bible Story Reference: Luke 19:1-10

Bible Verses: "The Son of Man came to look for and to save people who are lost."

(Luke 19:10, CEV)

Main Idea: Jesus loved and called Zacchaeus to come to him. Zacchaeus' life was changed because he said "yes" to Jesus. Jesus also loves and calls children, and their lives can be changed by saving "yes" to Jesus.



During this unit, children will

- Learn to think about how they can become more like what God wants them to be by learning from Jesus;
- Begin to understand that knowing Jesus can change their lives;
- Learn that Zacchaeus was transformed because he met Jesus and understood what Jesus was teaching;
- Learn that Jesus was sent by God to help those who are the least, the last, and the lost.

Family Communion Sunday

On February 5, First Church will be joining in Family Communion Sunday. This will be a meaningful service in which God's children of all ages will participate in communion. In order to prepare for this special occasion, on January 29 the Deacons will be visiting all of the Church School classes to talk about the meaning of Communion.

Here at First Church we practice two sacraments, and Holy Communion is one of them. The sacrament of Communion allows us a taste of God's Kingdom, which is a place where all are welcome at the table. Communion is a time of remembrance, praise and thanksgiving, confession, fellowship and commissioning. It provides us with an opportunity to remember and recall Jesus' final meal and his invitation to follow.

Our Communion is served at both services, and is for everyone who loves and seeks to follow God. In our denomination, children are always welcome to eat the bread and drink the juice; however, their participation is dependent on their parents' wishes.

Church School Mission Project: School Safe Zones

What do you expect to find at your children's school building? A roof? Classrooms? Bathrooms? Clean water flowing from faucets? Drinking fountains? Teachers? We would never dream of sending our children to a school without a solid building structure, plumbing and electricity. But this is the reality for many students worldwide, including in East Africa.



Schools are the bedrock of a community's health, well-being and future. They are a centering point and a place to learn and commune for the greater good. Yet the challenges that impoverished schools face can be steep. When a community struggles with limited access to clean water and sustainable food sources, it is often reflected in

the school buildings. A vibrant learning environment requires infrastructure, supplies and dedicated teachers.

Each year our Church School partners with a non-profit to help provide vital funding for programs serving the neediest among us. This year's Church School Mission Project is School Safe Zones through Church World Service. Through the School Safe Zones program, we will be helping to revitalize a school in East Africa. Our goal is raise \$10,000 for this special project. Here are just a few examples of how we can help!

\$600 = a latrine \$1,500 = a catchment system for improved sanitation








Adult Opportunities



Thursday Morning Study Group



The Thursday Morning Study Group will return January 12 from a holiday recess to look at the facts about German immigrant internment, as well as the widely publicized internment of Japanese immigrants and their American-born children during WWII. We will use a 2015 book by author Jan Jarboe Russell titled *The Train To Crystal City: FDR's Secret Prisoner Exchange Program and America's Only Family Internment Camp During World War II* as our guide for this interesting study. We may also have a guest who was in that camp at age six with us for our discussions. We will discuss this topic on two Thursdays, January 12 and 19. 

Book Signing and Presentation by Gordon Bates



On **January 29 at 3:00 p.m. in Schultz Hall**, Gordon Bates, our Minister of Visitation, will speak about his recently completed book to be released in early 2017. Published by Wesleyan University Press, Gordon draws upon his three decades of work with the Connecticut Prison Association (CPA) to describe the evolution of the police, courts and prisons in Connecticut. The CPA is a private, non-profit agency that was formed in 1875 and is still going strong under the name of Community Partners in Action. The title of Gordon's history is *The Connecticut Prison Association and The Search for Reformatory Justice*, which covers the years between 1875 and 2000. A separate coffee table book, with the text also written by Gordon, will be published in a few months with photographs that trace the CPA story into the 21st century.

Gordon began research on the agency's influence on Connecticut's criminal justice system in 2004 after retiring from his position as Minister of Justice

for the Connecticut Conference of the United Church of Christ. The CPA story is told within a national perspective that puts Connecticut's system in its larger context. **Gordon's book can be pre-ordered before January 1 on Amazon.com for a reduced price of \$25.00.** After January 2, the book will begin to arrive in bookstores in Connecticut and elsewhere for the market price of \$38.00.

Prayer and Share


