### **Prospective Member Gathering April 2**



## Micah House and Chapel Update



Work in the Hale House continues in preparation for a spring ground breaking on construction of the Micah House and Chapel. Self-help work crews completed removal of plaster and lath throughout the house by early January and are now carefully removing moldings, trim, doors and paneling for possible reinstallation or reuse. The team is also removing the chestnut wall planks with the hope of repurposing them into flooring for the chapel.

Throughout demolition teams are discovering artifacts. Perhaps most interesting is the discovery of a 1766 George III copper half-penny, found in the door frame between the first floor kitchen and southeast sunroom. It was common in

those days to install a commemorative coin during construction. The considerable wear on the coin and its being minted in Ireland suggest installation much later than 1766.

The team is also saving hundreds of old nails. Geoff Dellenbaugh researched the coin and nails and discovered that the many cut nails used throughout the home were possibly made by Connecticut prisoners beginning around 1780. These two artifacts, together with other construction techniques date the building circa 1780. While it's likely a home was first built on the site in 1714, the structure we see today apparently dates from much later in the century, with the kitchen ell being added sometime in the 1800s.

Three of the children are receiving orthodontic care, graciously offered pro bono by Dr. Risinger here in town.


Zeyad, the father in the family, is starting a painting business, with help from local contractor, Paul Cesana. (Church members

Her first events, which have included presentations on Syrian culture, have earned rave reviews. Zeyad is working on getting his driver's license so he can put the Thompsons' donated minivan back on the road.

Early this month, the family and First Church members participated in IRIS's 5K Run for Refugees followed by a rally at the New Haven Green, as seen in the group photo. With First Church friends, the family made signs the day before to show their support for all refugees. ### Foodshare Volunteer Opportunity – We Need You!

Hunger is an invisible problem, so most people are unaware of how large a problem it is. In Hartford and Tolland counties alone, the area served by Foodshare, there are 137,000 people who cannot be sure where their next meal is coming from. The majority of these 137,000 people are either children or seniors, and the majority of the rest are working full-time jobs (or two). Foodshare's vision is for a community where all of these people can get all of the food they need. And as the region's food bank, they work toward that vision by getting food donations from the food industry and distributing them to 300 food pantries, community kitchens, homeless shelters and other partner programs.



Here at First Church, we have the Mobile Foodshare truck come to our back parking lot every other Wednesday. Now we have a new opportunity to go to the Foodshare warehouse in Hartford on alternating Wednesday mornings to help sort and package the produce so it all gets given out to our neighbors. **Starting March** 

**8**, we hope to send five to ten volunteers to the warehouse to sort produce from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. People will gather in the church parking lot at 8 a.m. to drive in together. Foodshare sponsors this service, and it takes place **every other Wednesday (March 1, 15 and 29)** in our back parking lot. cards and cookies for members of our congregation, sorting fresh produce at Foodshare's warehouse


in Hartford and serving lunch at St. Vincent de Paul in Middletown. Thanks to all who participated! This beloved



### Church School Unit 6: "Easter - Peter's Story"

Bible Story Reference: John 18:15-27; 21:1-19

**Bible Verses:** Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." (John 21:15)

**Main Idea:** Following Jesus is not always easy. Peter was afraid and told people that Jesus was not his friend; later Jesus forgave him. We remember that Jesus loves us and forgives us.







Hartford, and the balance went to One Great Hour of Sharing. The Thanksgiving 2016 offering yielded a collection of \$7,592. These funds were donated in equal parts to Back Bay Mission, Bloomfield Backpack Project, Integrated Refugee and Immigrant Services (IRIS) and the Louisiana flood recovery work. For the Christmas 2016 offering, parishioners gave \$14,148 and equal amounts were donated to the Glastonbury Fuel Bank, Horace Bushnell Children's Food Pantry, Manchester Area Conference of Churches, Hands on Hartford and HELO Haiti. During this past year we collected \$33,396 with our special offerings.

These dollars came from our annual Church School mission project, Vacation Bible School mission project, Shrimp Boil, Council Discretionary Fund, Interfaith Thanksgiving Service, Covenant to Care Fund and Thompson Mission Fund.
